- Father involvement in schools is associated with higher likelihood of a student getting mostly A's. Children with more involved fathers experience fewer behavioral problems (www.fatherhood.org).

at Summit County Children Services:

- Assist in locating and engaging fathers
- Provide consultation to caseworkers
- Facilitate fatherhood groups using the "24/7 Dad " curriculum from the National Fatherhood Initiative
- Provide mediation
- Instruct fathers on parent education
- Attend court hearings
- Train and coach child welfare staff
- Refer fathers to community resources as deemed appropriate
